Lyon Park is a large four form entry primary school in the London borough of Brent. As a school which understands the importance of sport, Lyon Park continues to strive towards increased participation and inclusion. The school will receive £22,940 for the financial year 2022-23 (1st April 2022 – 31st March 2023).

Increase the provision of extracurricular sport clubs. Last year we had 300 spaces for extra-curricular sports clubs across three terms. In the Autumn and Spring term of 2022/23 we are offering 352 spaces across 18 different clubs. Our annual offer of extra-curricular clubs will be 542 places across 28 different clubs. Uptake levels averaged at 81% with 441 places being filled. 97% of children commented positively about the level of enjoyment they had while taking part and all children taking part understood the positive impact this would have their health. We will also continue to monitor participation levels to ensure the offer is meeting the needs of our pupils and continues to increase.
